Executive summary

The Greater Penrith to Eastern Creek (GPEC) Strategic Framework (the Strategic Framework) provides a shared vision to manage future growth and change in the investigation area. By 2056, the population of the GPEC area is projected to grow by around 135,000 people, driven by the new Western Sydney International Airport, the Western Sydney Aerotropolis and significant transport investment in the Western Parkland City.

The Strategic Framework identifies that growth in the coming decades will be focused on 6 key precincts for growth, be supported by major transport infrastructure and will consist of new development areas and urban renewal, within existing urban areas. Priorities, directions and actions are also identified to guide future detailed planning and enable development to align with infrastructure. Enabling and supporting infrastructure in the priority areas of St Marys Town Centre and Orchard Hills is outlined in the framework to indicate the infrastructure that is required to unlock development in these areas and respond to the commencement of operation of the Western Sydney International Airport and Sydney Metro Western Sydney Airport line.

The Strategic Framework has been led by the NSW Department of Planning and Environment (the department), in close collaboration with Penrith City Council, Blacktown City Council, other NSW Government agencies (state agencies) and other stakeholders.

This finalisation report outlines the exhibition and consultation process, summarises the issues raised in submissions and reports on how these issues have been addressed in the final Strategic Framework and supporting studies.

The draft Strategic Framework was exhibited from 18 November to 16 December 2022, together with supporting technical studies and reports that informed its preparation.

Twenty-two submissions were received on the draft Strategic Framework, including:

- 13 submissions from state agencies and other internal departmental stakeholders
- 2 submissions from councils
- 4 submissions from industry
- 3 submissions from community members.

The key issues raised in the submissions include:

- support for the emphasis on caring for and connecting with Country
- support for retention of waterways in their natural state and the focus on water quality, improving the blue/green grid and the need for a holistic, integrated approach to water cycle management
- the importance of councils having flexibility in providing open space and achieving tree canopy targets
- the importance of identifying staging and sequencing, as far as the scope of the framework allows

• the need to achieve appropriate densities that will support public transport.

The department has responded to the small number of submissions that commented on the *Social Infrastructure and Open Space Needs Analysis*. This study has also been updated and is included in the finalisation package.

The Aboriginal Engagement Outcomes Report has also been updated, in response to feedback received from submissions and further engagement with Aboriginal Traditional Owners.

1. Introduction

1.1 Overview of the GPEC Strategic Framework

In 2018, the Western Sydney City Deal and *Greater Sydney Region Plan* identified the Greater Penrith to Eastern Creek (GPEC) Investigation Area as an area suitable for future growth and change.

The Department of Planning and Environment (the department) collaborated with Penrith and Blacktown City Councils and key state agencies to prepare the Strategic Framework.

The Strategic Framework consolidates and builds on local and state strategic planning to set a direction for future growth and development in the GPEC Investigation Area. It identifies:

- A vision for the area
- A spatial framework that includes:
 - Locations to focus new development
 - Areas that are already established and will see limited change
 - Places to be retained for open space, environmental or cultural heritage purposes
- Planning priorities to achieve the vision
- Directions and actions to implement the planning priorities
- Regional and district scale infrastructure needed to support growth to 2056.

The Strategic Framework identifies 6 focus precincts for growth over the short to long term. These focus precincts are based on areas that:

- Are undergoing transformation (Orchard Hills and St Marys)
- Are part of the existing east-west economic corridor that stretches from Penrith CBD in the west to Rooty Hill in the east (Penrith Centre, Kingswood and Werrington, Mount Druitt Centre and Rooty Hill)
- Will be changed in the future by catalytic transport infrastructure (Luxford).

The Strategic Framework outlines requirements for future detailed planning. Consideration of these requirements in the planning and design process will ensure planning proposals and precinct planning demonstrate best practice in working towards holistic outcomes envisaged for the GPEC area.

2. Exhibition details

2.1 Prior engagement

Following identification of the GPEC Investigation Area in 2018, state government agencies, the councils and other key stakeholders worked together to identify a vision for this area. This visioning work informed preparation of the draft Place-Based Infrastructure Compact for the Western Parkland City (PIC).

Targeted stakeholder engagement on the GPEC Strategic Framework began in 2021 with state government agencies involved in Project Collaboration Group (PCG) meetings. Input from the PCG and additional feedback from both Penrith and Blacktown City Councils helped to refine the draft Strategic Framework, before it was publicly exhibited in late 2022.

2.2 Exhibition period

The Strategic Framework and supporting studies were exhibited for 28 days from Friday 18 November to Friday 16 December 2022.

Most of the feedback was received within this period, and several agencies and both councils granted extensions to enable finalisation of their submissions.

2.2 Exhibited materials and notification

The department's website was updated with information about the GPEC area and a link to the exhibition of the draft Strategic Framework on the Planning Portal on Friday 18 November 2022.

In addition to the exhibition package listed below, a Frequently Asked Questions page was provided to help stakeholders understand why the draft Strategic Framework has been prepared and how it will shape growth and change within the GPEC area.

Formal comments were sought from Transport for NSW (TfNSW) and Sydney Metro.

TfNSW did not provide a formal submission. However, the department's GPEC project team collaborated closely with TfNSW to develop and validate the transport-related content within the final Strategic Framework.

Sydney Metro was also consulted in preparation and finalisation of the Strategic Framework and provided feedback on relevant actions.

Following exhibition, the department engaged GHD and Zion Engagement and Planning to undertake further targeted consultation with Aboriginal stakeholders. This included 2 further engagement sessions with Aboriginal stakeholders who participated in the engagement process in 2021, to gather further feedback and inform the final Strategic Framework.

3.2 Broad support for the draft strategic framework

Overall, feedback received on the draft Strategic Framework was positive. Thirty-seven comments expressed support for specific actions, directions, or priorities. Most of the comments contained recommendations or suggestions for improving or strengthening the Strategic Framework or to guide implementation. There were no comments that explicitly objected to the draft Strategic Framework.

3.3 Issues raised in submissions

From the 22 submissions a total of 291 comments were received. Across these comments 37 key issues have been identified across 14 main topics

The comments received were relatively evenly split across the main topics. Over half of the comments related to resilience and sustainability, policy matters, infrastructure, or sought minor editorial changes, with these themes comprising 15%, 13%, 11% and 18% of comments received respectively. The next most common comments related of the topics of collaboration and consultation (8%), biodiversity and conservation (7%), with housing, cultural heritage, transport and employment and tourism each comprising 5% of the overall comments received. The remaining topics of implementation consisted of requests for further information, explicit support for the Strategic Framework and site-specific requests or comments.




Figure 1 | Key submission topics

The breakdown of main topics raised is shown below in **Figure 1.** Key issues and responses are discussed in part 4 of this document.

4.1 Key submission issues and responses

A breakdown of key issues raised, and the department's response is summarised in Table 1.

4.2 Project Collaboration Group feedback

A series of PCG workshops were held in February to April 2023 to discuss and resolve key issues raised in submissions. These sessions and their key focus areas included:

- 15 February 2023 Overview of submissions received
- 22 February 2023 Tree canopy and open space
- 7 March 2023 Growth and density
- 3 April 2023 Infrastructure funding and sequencing

Each session included:

- An overview of the issue/s and strategic context
- How the draft Strategic Framework dealt with the issue/s
- A discussion regarding role of the Strategic Framework in the wider policy context or achieving the relevant targets/benchmarks.

The workshops resulted in the following additional changes to the final Strategic Framework:

- Tree canopy:
 - Greater flexibility is provided for Councils to achieve place-specific tree canopy targets

- The tree canopy target table (table 2) was amended to align with Open Space, Street and Precinct targets in the Greener Neighbourhoods Guide
- Open space:
 - Revision of actions relating to open space provision for smaller sites (<2ha)
 - The open space criteria table (table 1) was amended to align with the draft Greener Places Guide
 - Clarification of the open space target for larger sites (minimum 15% Net Developable Land) and inclusion of a methodology for calculating Net Developable Land (NDL) in Appendix 1
 - A focus on consideration of a percentage NDL open space provision in areas of medium and higher density residential uses
- Growth and density:

- Infrastructure funding and sequencing:

 - Inclusion of an additional action to collaborate on the pilot Urban Development Program for the Western Parkland City Pilot to coordinate infrastructure planning, if the pilot is adopted

5.2 Amendments to supporting technical studies

Social Infrastructure and Open Space Needs Assessment

Urbis prepared a *Social Infrastructure and Open Space Needs Assessment Report* in consultation with key stakeholders including Penrith and Blacktown City Councils and state government agencies. This report was exhibited as part of the planning package alongside the draft Strategic Framework.

Some comments received during exhibition related to this report, which has been updated and finalised. These changes were to refine content so that the report aligns with local government and state agency social infrastructure provision and timeframes.

Aboriginal Engagement Outcomes Report

GHD and Zion Engagement and Planning engaged with members of the Aboriginal community about the priorities for the GPEC Strategic Framework in 2021. The *Aboriginal Engagement Outcomes Report* was exhibited as part of the planning package alongside the draft Strategic Framework.

Stakeholders from the Aboriginal community who were involved in the initial consultation in 2021 were offered the opportunity to comment on how their input had been incorporated into the draft Strategic Framework's priorities, directions, actions and mapping. GHD and Zion Engagement and Planning facilitated 2 online sessions to gather feedback about the draft Strategic Framework. These sessions focused on key elements of the Strategic Framework of most relevance to Aboriginal stakeholders including the Acknowledgement of Country, and Priority 1 – Connect with and Care for Country. As a result, Figure 4 was amended to more accurately reflect traditional Aboriginal travelling routes, clarify the intent of mapping places of shared culture, and to include an

additional view corridor. Other minor editorial changes were also made following these sessions to ensure accuracy and clarify intent. An Addendum, summarising feedback gathered during these sessions, has been included to update and finalise the Aboriginal Engagement Outcomes Report.
